## revecca Community celebrates Prof. Green's doctorate

Professor Timothy Green-can breathe a longawaited sigh of relief. He has recently received his Ph.D in Hebrew Bible from Vanderbilt University. He has spent over 8 \_ years in the thought process of his dissertation and three years in deep intensive research. The title of his dissertation is Class Differentiation

Power(lessness) in 8th -century b.c.e. Israel and Judea. It is a focus on political and anthropological methods dealing with Israel and the Old Testament. It is in essence a sociological look at the Bible. His dissertation was of such excellent quality that Vanderbilt has recommended it for publication.

Green said that ever since his senior year in college he has felt that he

## Eye on your scholarships

How can I find scholarship? How can I get more scholarships? These are common questions we hear in the financial Aid Office. Let's talk about where to look for scholarships.

Academic- If you maintain full-time enrollment and have at least a 3.3 G.P.A., you would qualify for a \$1,000 deans Scholarship. A 3.4 cumulative GPA would be \$1500 scholarship, and a 3.5 cumulative GPA would be worth \$2000. Additional scholarship money is added if you have a 4.0. For the 97-98 school year, \$378,217 has been awarded to students from the Deans Scholarship program.

Endowed: Each spring the scholarship Committee awards money to students from Trevecca's endowed scholarships. This is money that has been given to Trevecca by donors for the sole purpose of creating scholarships. This year approximately \$70,00 was awarded to returning student. Look for the Endowed Scholarship Application in your mailbox during the last week of January.

SGA: There is scholarship money awarded to executive SGA positions. Interested in running for political office?

RA: free room and board is rewarded to students that serve as Resident assistants. Check with Student Services if you are interested.

Other TNU Scholarships include forensics, radio, music, drama and education.

Look at some of the possibilities. An Eye on Your Aid.

Local Nazarene Church If you attend a Nazarene Church in the southeast United States, you may be able to get a \$750 scholarship. If your local church sends \$250, TNU will add an additional \$500. The church must have paid their TNU budget in full. This year a total of \$210,573 has been awarded to students from the church matching program.

District: Nazarene students from North Carolina, South Carolina, eat Tennessee, North Florida, South Alabama, Kentucky and Georgia have received some scholarship money this year from

Private: This year Trevecca Students have received \$70,308 in private scholarships. Often these are scholarships that are awarded in you local community by Rotary Clubs, foundations, local industry ect. Look for announcements in your local newspaper. Your Financial Aid Office has additional information on private scholarships including private scholarship books that you can check out. We also have resource lists for other scholarship books and web sites that we can give you.

The main focus of the Mission Club is to introduce Trevecca students to people in their own city who need help. They work individually with people who live in the Napier Projects, by tutoring children in their schoolwork and also giving literacy classes for the adults. In addition, the Mission Club works with Nashville's chapter of World Relief, a foreign relief agency for refugees. World Relief is sponsored and hosted by Grandview Baptist Church on Nolensville Road, and is under the direction of Professor Eby's husband, Lee Eby. America through the love of Christ. They fulfill this objective by providing temporary housing for refugee families as they seek employment and also by teaching them English as their second language. Local churches donate household items and volunteer transportation for running errands, such as getting a driver's license, going to the laundromat, or simply going shopping. Members of Trevecca's Mission Club help in both of these ways. Vicky emphasizes that there is no specific time requirement for participation in the Mission Club; the only obligation is to be willing to help when you can. 


