Rev. Greathouse Is Speaker For Commencement; Will Receive Degree

Rev. W. M. Greathouse, Dean of Religion at Trevecca Nazarene College, will give the Commencement address Tuesday evening, June 6, after which he will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Rev. Greathouse was born in Van Buren, Arkansas, but has spent most of his life in Tennessee.

While pastoring the Church of the Nazarene in Jackson, Tennessee, he was graduated from Lambeth College with an A.B. degree in Religion. Two years later he received the Th.B. degree from Trevecca. Then in 1948 he was graduated from Vanderbilt University School of Religion with a M.A. degree in theology.

For several years Rev. Greathouse pastored the Nazarene Church in Clarksville, Tennessee.

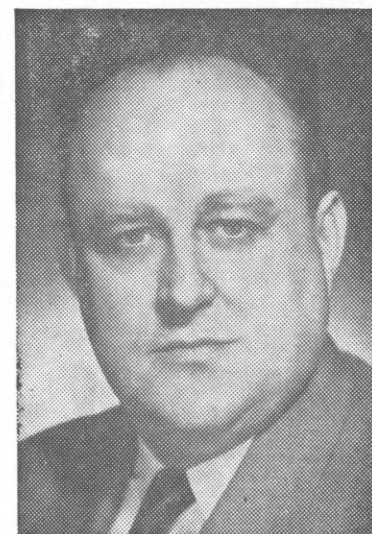
