
Dr. Bracken Addresses **Ministerial** Association



The teamwork, unity, and cooperative spirit that the Sophomores have shown all season paid off by giving them the Trevecca football championship for the 1955 season. The undefeated Sophomores defeated the hapless Freshmen Thursday, to win the championship game 79-0.

Moody Gunter ran around end five yards for the first touchdown, which set the pace for a scoring riot.

Gunter passed to Ed Whittington (3), Walton Brown (3), Don Pyles (2), and Robert Hedgepath (1) for nine T.D.s.
