raucous, silent; together, alone . . . all in one life. When we begin to grow in one way another part of us shrinks.














No body of people however small immerses itself entirely in one all-consuming passion. Steps to a goal are not the goal.

We must let every individual express his yearnings for self-fulfillment because we all have the same longings.




This desire to transcend ourselves, which permeates humanity, often leads to a seeking for God. Finding Him adds another dimension to our strivings to live completely.

In each man's search for meaning lies the bond of mankind. Only when he vulnerably reveals his inner being in an individual manner does communication occur.


Although a person gropes to understand himself, it is not until he is involved with another that an exchange of valuable human ideals enriches the human race.








Policy Makers

NNC's President and his wife have been given special tribute by members of the Board of Regents, faculty, and staff for "25 years of devotion and meritorious service" to the college. During the period in which Dr. Riley has served as college president, the total value of campus assets has increased by \$6 million. Northwest Nazarene College's Board of Regents met on the campus twice during the school year, 1968-69. The regents, with Rev. Raymond Kratzer, chairman, dedicated the H. Orton Wiley Learning Center, gave raises to college personnel, and approved new appointments for the coming year.

Mr. Dan Etulain, Dean of Men, has been granted a graduate study leave for the next two years.








In order to serve the students to a greater extent, a Zerox machine was placed in the library. Many of the students and faculty have made it a valuable asset.

Dr. F. C. Sutherland, faculty emeritus, continues to expand and complete the archives.

Under the stimulus of Dr. Riley, for whom the library is named, a new five year, \$50,000 library improvement plan was instigated. It calls for a systematic increase in the number of volumes and service-ability of the library.


The sociology department added forty-four volumes to the library. The series, entitled **The American Negro: His History and Literature** is considered the most important contribution of blacks to the writing of their own history.

Education and Psychology

In May of 1968, NNC was officially accredited by NCATE, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. The ten-year approval was retroactive so that any student who completed the NNC program of education since 1967 has passed the NCATE requirements and high standards. The evaluating committee commented favorably about the students, faculty, and college leadership.

The H. Orton Wiley Learning Center added immeasurably to the dimension of education at NNC. Office suites accommodate the divisions of Language and Literature, and Education and Psychology. The room shapes, furniture mobility, and modern equipment all diversify the possible activities. Conventions on campus now can meet in a comfortable, versatile building.



Construction plans for the proposed physical education building have been delayed due to a reduction of available federal funds. If reapplication is successful construction should begin in the spring of 1970.


Scuba diving, under the direction of Jim Morrell, made its debut this year. All students who passed the course earned national certification.

History


Dr. Woodward's home on Monday evenings was the scene for the history seminar. The more relaxed atmosphere generated a thorough grasp of pertinent concepts of history.

One of the highlights of the Economics Geography class was a guest lecture by Wendell Christiansen.




Religion and Philosophy

Action was the key word this year. Early in the year Dr. Jones attended the convention of the American Academy of Religion in Dallas, Texas.



Students, professors, and assistants often team up for special projects.








blies program. Leaders from all types of occupations are selected to attend.


During the first term Miss Long attended the University of Denver where she studied Art History and took lessons in modern art. Her work was on display when she returned.


Throughout the year, a number of students also displayed their creative originals. A series on black art hung in the building for some time, too.

On the far side of the moon on Christmas Day the crew of Apollo 8 ignited the boosters for their return trip while those on the earth held their breath to hear the voices of the spacemen. Everything followed the schedule.

On the second voyage to the moon, Apollo 10, carrying Stafford, Young, and Cernan, took a lunar landing module. At the moon, Stafford and Cernan detached themselves from the ship and descended to within 49,856 feet of the moon's surface in the module. 

The Individual Learning Center is used regularly by many students and professors. Much new equipment prepares the Media Center for the day the TV Studio will be used.




Founder's Day

The \$800,000 H. Orton Wiley Learning Center was dedicated and tours of the modern facility were directed by those who will be responsible for implementing its potential.









Inerations











Nampa Concert Series




Halloween



Stage Band concerts become more wellknown and better attended each year. The excellent performances always enrapture the audiences.



University of Idaho's Vandaleer Choir performed excellently for Nampa residents while on their spring tour in March.





Choirs and Northwesterners in Concert







The voices of the Crusader Choir have been heard in several special chapels. A tour during spring term highlighted the year for the group directed by Mr. Marvin Bloomquist.









Senior Day Amidst Commotion of Elections

In later general elections, Paul Stallcop won reelection for treasurer and Jan Friberg was elected secretary. Both were unopposed.




















Frosh and Sophs. Combined Parties

Second term was just right for a freshman class party at Bogus Basin. Sophomores sponsored several aftergame parties to raise money for the class.






Juniors and Seniors Banquet in the Spanish Style














When it is spring time, third term, care-free but loaded with studies then is the perfect occasion for an all-school picnic at Idaho City.

Food, games, and sight-seeing occupied the students' time. And if that was not sufficient, then, as all typical college students do, they created their own fun.
































Commencement 1969 witnessed the graduation of 217 students with a bachelor of arts degree from Northwest Nazarene College. Thus far it was the largest graduating class.

Graduation exercises were preceded by at least four years of rigorous study climaxed by the night of June 9, 1969.




Monday began with a breakfast

Confusion reigned for a few moments as congratulations were exchanged and last goodbyes uttered reluctantly. The Class of 1969 was no longer the senior class.












Harriers Finish Third in District





Finishing with an outstanding 10-6 win-loss record, the J.V. Basketball squad promises bright hope for future varsity teams.


Leading scorer was Ken Wilde, averaging 17.8 points per game. Wilde was also leading rebounder with Laird Graham following.

Wally Moore did an outstanding job in the onehalf mile. Terry Cantrell added many points with his tremendous speed in the hurdles.








