CONVERSATION CENTRAL

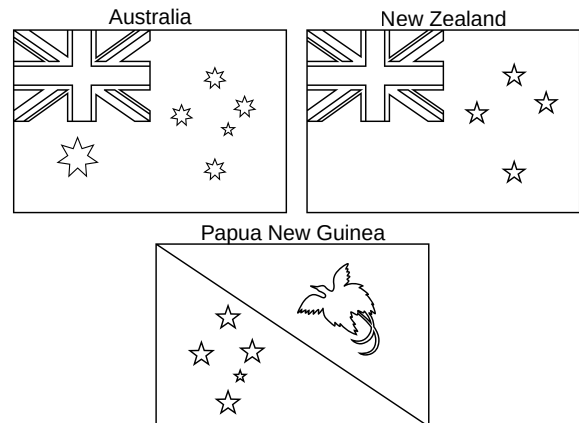
Have you ever tried something new like playing a sport or instrument? Is it easy trying something new?

When a missionary or a missions team goes to a different country to serve, they might need to learn the language. In Australia and New Zealand, English is spoken. In Papua New Guinea, English is spoken in many places, but Tok Pisin is the common language spoken everywhere.

Hallelujah, Hallelujah, Hallelujah, Hey, Hallelujah!

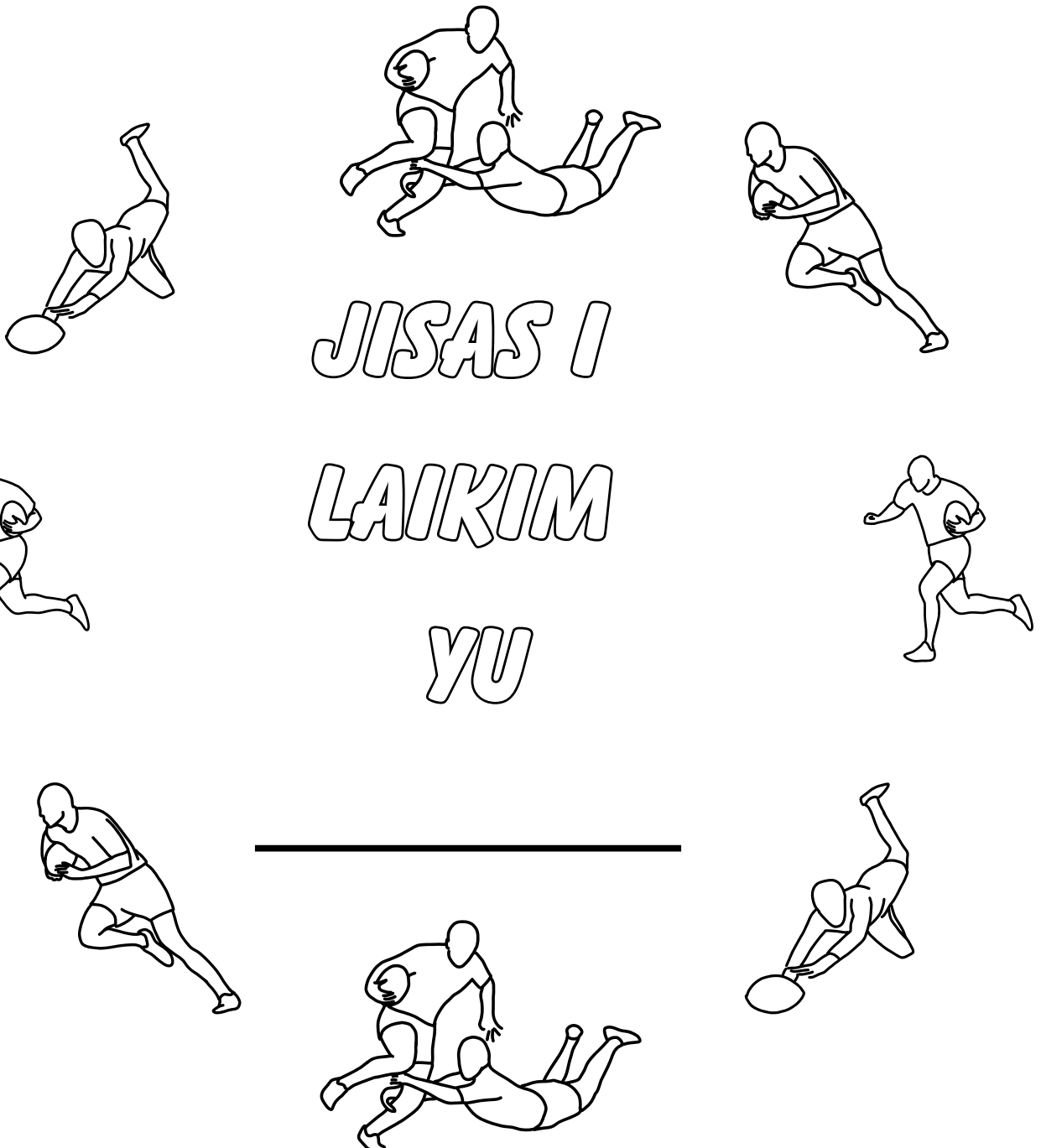
Hallelujah, Hey Hallelujah, Yes I am happy because my God is big!

When the ANZ team prepared for this missions trip to PNG, they were unsure about what they wanted to do as their missions project. Sometimes even the most prepared teams head to a place and their plan changes. But being open to what the Lord leads us to do and being obedient in that allows for the most amazing opportunities. The ANZ team played touch football every day at 4 p.m. and this helped them to connect with many of the local boys. Relationships were built on the rugby field during this missions trip, as well as in the hospital and all of the places the team served. Connection is so important; that is how we build the church!

What are some ways you can connect with someone today? Maybe it is saying Hi at school, or asking someone to play at the playground. Take a look at the Kaleidoscope. 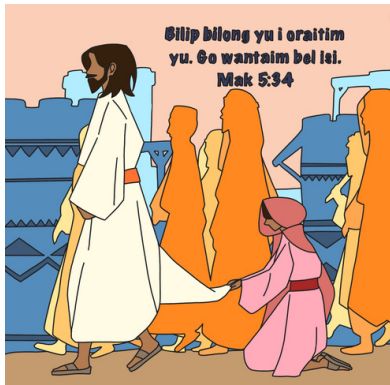
Don't forget to tell them "Jesus Loves you."
